# THE HOWE ISLAND GARDEN BUD STORY

Our story begins on a small island located in Lake Ontario, east of Kingston, in Frontenac County. It is part of the world famous Thousand Islands chain.

The island was renamed on July 16, 1792, from "Isle Cauchois" to "Howe Island", in honor of William Howe, 5<sup>th</sup> Viscount Howe, a British officer who served under General James Wolfe at the Battle of The Plains of Abraham during the Seven Year War.

The island's lone small Roman Catholic Church, Saint Philomena's, and its cemetery are a testimonial to the waves of early settlers and their descendants who still live and own land here.

Howe Island hosts a shared community of farming as well as fulltime residents and seasonal cottagers. There are no public facilities, no shops or restaurants and no public gathering places.

The early access to the island was via boat or by crossing the frozen ice in winter.

Currently (2024) the island is accessed by two ferries, a ten-car ferry at the base of Joyceville Road and a three-car ferry at the island's eastern tip.

In 1997 the Township of Howe Island ended and it was amalgamated into the Township of Frontenac Islands the following year. Local islanders (proposal Glenys Elliott) were inspired to make donations towards the installation of a sign designed by Faye Muller commemorating the former township of Howe Island's 107 years' existence (1871 to 1997). The completed sign was erected in front of the Township Offices on Baseline Road.

A few years later, in 2000, Judy Hyre and Faye Muller decided to form a women's group in the pursuit of gardening knowledge. There was no email at the time; flyers were placed in the residents' mail boxes to recruit interested members.

Monthly meetings commenced in members' homes. Gardening issues were researched and presented by individual members. The positions of Director, Treasurer and Secretary were established. A club name was agreed upon. Minutes were taken and a 50/50 draw was started to fund guest speakers and outings.

The club blossomed and in August of 2000, in collaboration with the township, limestone from an old island farm (Tom Norris's) was transported to the base of the new Howe Island Township sign and an informal surrounding garden, designed by



Faye Muller, followed. Husbands and township and community members volunteered their time, effort and machinery to complete the project. Watering and weeding rosters were drawn up. The community now had a monument at the entrance to the Township Office.

The Club then turned its sights to the main ferry landing where they were expecting the arrival of the new Frontenac Howe Islander ferry. Proposals were submitted for the development of two new garden beds to beautify the area on either side of the roadway and along the long fence. An automatic watering system was installed by David Higgs. The gardens were designed by member island resident Faye Muller and financed by the Garden Club, the Township and donations. The installation was done by Garden Buds, their spouses and other donated labor. A news article by Margaret Knott appeared in The Heritage paper on

November 9, 2004, detailing the club activities at this location and its ongoing fundraising efforts for the works throughout the island.

Numerous other garden landscaping projects were undertaken throughout the island and over the years. These gardens are still maintained by new and current members of this women's club. These hardworking volunteer ladies can be seen performing in garden work parties at various sites throughout the gardening season,



in their pink t-shirts with the club logo designed by Faye Muller. The club will reach a quarter century milestone next year in 2025 and, of course, while many members are no longer with us, many new comers are always willing to step in and join this unique and special island club. To be a Howe Island Garden Bud, you must live on the island, and you must participate in team work parties.







In the Rear-view Mirror: The Kingston Historical Society's First 131 Years

The Society returned from its summer break at its September 18th meeting when Historic Kingston editor **Peter Gower** took members on a nostalgic and instructive walk through the first 131 years of the Society's history. Gower, author of Kingston in 150 Pictures and a past president of the Society, structured his talk around three questions: What prompted the creation the KHS founded in 1893? What have been its activities since? What might lie in its future?

The initial impulse behind the Society was rooted in a sense that the city had a venerable past, one nurtured by its United Empire Loyalist origins and epitomized by the 1891 death of Sir John A. Its early membership drew heavily on the civic "establishment", mostly men and a few women such as political economist Adam Shortt and writer Agnes Maule Machar, people who recognized the need to both record, celebrate and preserve the city's past. Plaques, published histories and the creation of museums such as The Society's undertaking of the Murney Tower bastion as a focal point in 1922. In pursuit of these activities, the Society's membership peaked at 600 in the Centennial-fueled enthusiasm of the 1960s.

Gower made plain that the Society's evolution has not always been "plain sailing." Of late, for instance, the Society has had to adjust its one-time unbridled adulation of Sir John A. as the nation absorbed the reality of "truth and reconciliation" with our Indigenous peoples. History changes its perspectives just as society shifts in its priorities and acknowledgements. So too, Gower suggested, must the Society.

Looking to the Society's future, Gower ended his superb talk by expressing a hope that the Society might finally take a role in the long-dreamed-of idea of a museum of Kingston's three hundred years. Musuems, just like the activities of local historical societies, remind us that objects in our rear-view mirrors are much closer than they appear.

The **Canadian Institute for Historical Education**, <u>CIHE</u>, has been under way just since the beginning of 2023 and has already had some notable success in challenging the false narratives – often overly simplistic and unfairly negative – that have been promulgated about some of our builders and heroes. We believe Canada's history – *in all its complexity and colour* – should be celebrated not canceled. https://cihe.ca/


Elizabeth Durno reporting on events of interest to history buffs


