Kingston Historical Society Award 2025: Alan MacLachlan

In commemoration of the one hundred and thirty-first anniversary of the founding of the Kingston Historical Society in 1893, this award is presented in recognition of outstanding contributions to the preservation and interpretation of local history.

The Kingston Historical Society recognizes Alan MacLachlan in appreciation of his tireless efforts in support of the Kingston Historical Society and local Kingston history, over a period of 25 years. Alan MacLachlan served the Society, first as an eager councillor, then as President and Past President. After his service with the Executive of the Society, Alan MacLachlan continued his work on Council and is best recognized as the manager of the June 6th, Sir John A. Macdonald grave site ceremonies. During the 12 years he held this position he worked diligently to make this commemoration of an important Kingston historical event, often under trying circumstances as Sir John A. later became a figure of National controversy. He ensured that Kingston VIPs such as the Mayor, local MP, MPPs as well as the Fort Henry Guard were on site to add to the significance and importance of the ceremony. He was instrumental in bringing to the event speakers of national and political importance; each of these speakers added to the threads of the history of Kingston. Perhaps the most important quality of Alan was his level headiness in decision making and his wonderful sense of humour. There is no question that Alan MacLachlen enriched the Kingston Historical Society and Kingston during his time, and he is richly deserving of this award.

Historic Kingston 73, featuring the Keewatin on the cover, was published in February for distribution at the Heritage Lecture. It is hoped that Historic Kingston 74 will be available for the 2025 Heritage Lecture. Its cover shows the Murney Tower during the solar eclipse. Dr. Riehkl's paper (from September 2023) is not included, as it was no longer available as promised. John Grenville's paper Edward R. Beckwith (1879-1963), from November 2024, will be published in Historic Kingston 75. There is a steady flow of requests for copies of past papers, usually sold as pdfs from researchers whose libraries do not have the original copies. My thanks to all presenters who continue to be prompt when submitting their papers, and to Betty Andrews who proofreads meticulously and picks out everything I have not noticed.

e) The Editor's Report, Limelight---2024

Limelight is the newsletter of the Kingston Historical Society, published in nine monthly issues from September to May. Allan Graphics is the printer. Forty copies of Limelight were mailed each month, with the other members receiving Limelight by email. Featured monthly in *Limelight* were ads for the KHS sponsors, notifications of deaths of members, a welcome to new members, a message from President Paul Charbonneau, the report on the month's speaker by Program Chair Dr. Duncan McDowall, the announcement of the presenter for the next meeting and a Murney Tower activity update, as well as reports on the progress of the fund raising campaign for the 100th anniversary of the Murney Tower in 2025. In March the Great Lakes Museum volunteers were noted as the award winners for the KHS annual award and in September the student winners of the recently-initiated history award were announced. In September Secker, Ross and Perry was replaced by Grant Thornton as a sponsor. In September *Limelight* was published in a twelve-page edition rather than the usual 8-page edition. This year, Dr. Jennifer McKendry's Still Standing column featured the Fairfield-Gutzeit House, the house at 81 King Street and the Douglas Library, which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2024. A three-part series on the newly-opened Bellevue House was submitted by Bruce Macmillan. Articles and opinion pieces of local historical interest appeared, as well as mention of recently-published books by members and other local historians. The reissue of a KHS publication, To Build a Good Neighbourhood, Grenville Park, the First Fifty Years, by Phyllida Kent, was announced. The column, Ear to the Ground by Elizabeth Durno, reporting on events of interest to history buffs, which began in 2023, continued. A highlight of this year's local events reported on was the opening to the public by the Great Lakes Museum of their newly-acquired S.S. Keewatin. The Heritage event in February and the June 6 gathering, commemorating Canada's first prime minister Sir John A. Macdonald, received coverage. Thanks to Webmaster Peter Gower who posts *Limelight* to the KHS website and to Membership Chair Paul Van Nest who proofreads each issue, posts the website link to those who receive *Limelight* by email, and supplies labels for mailing *Limelight* to members who receive a hard copy.

h) The Murney Tower National Historic Site Committee Report---2024

2024 was a remarkable year at the Murney Tower Museum! On May 20th, we proudly reopened our doors to the public, and over the following four months, we welcomed approximately 13,000 visitors. This year marked the launch of the Centennial Initiative, an ambitious effort to transform the museum's upcoming 100th anniversary into a Kingston-wide celebration of local history, arts, and heritage.

Our commitment to accessibility grew tremendously in 2024. We introduced a French audio tour, two new interactive exhibits, and a French Access Guide—key steps toward making the museum more inclusive and engaging for disabled communities in Kingston.

The Murney Tower Museum was as dynamic as ever, extending its reach beyond its walls. We participated in classrooms, community events, public celebrations, and even outdoor spaces like streets and parks—bringing local arts, history, and culture to where our communities gather.

As we reflect on 2024, we cherish the countless memorable moments shared with our visitors, whether they were local families discovering their city's rich history, regional school groups exploring our interactive exhibits, or international tourists captivated by the stories housed within our historic walls. Each encounter reaffirmed the museum's role as a cornerstone of Kingston's heritage and a bridge connecting people through shared experiences of art, culture, and history. Looking ahead, we are excited to continue building on this success by expanding our programs, introducing new initiatives, and creating even more opportunities for connection and learning. 16

As we celebrate these accomplishments, we also bid farewell to Dr. Simge Erdogan-O'Connor, whose five years of exceptional leadership profoundly shaped the museum. Under her guidance, the museum was modernized and rebranded, its operations improved, and its strategic priorities redefined. Simge's innovative leadership raised the museum's profile and established its place in Kingston's heritage landscape. We will miss her greatly and wish her all the best!

Looking ahead to our 100th year celebrations, I am excited for what the future holds. I am deeply grateful for the unwavering support of the Kingston Historical Society, Parks Canada and our staff, volunteers, and community. Together, we are bringing history to life.

i) The Program Report---2024

The Kingston Historical Society lectures in 2024 were presented in hybrid fashion: live presentation in the comfortable Theatre Lounge of the Kingsbridge Retirement Community (950 Centennial Drive), accompanied by refreshments, AND via Zoom simultaneously. Society members were emailed the Zoom link on the Friday before each lecture. Lectures were also open to the public. Lectures were subsequently posted on YouTube by the weekend following each presentation and later published in the Society's annual journal. Special thanks to Paul Van Nest, Peter Gower, Craig Pettis, Betty Andrews and Vincent Durant for their support of the program.

Wednesday, January 17th: Professor Gordon Dueck of the Queen's history department talked about the cultural history of the Black community in Kingston: "Barbers in Blackface? African-Canadian Musicians in Fin-de-Siecle Kingston."

Sunday, February 18th @ 2:00 pm in the Memorial Hall of City Hall: In conjunction with the Frontenac Heritage Foundation, the Society celebrated Family Day/Heritage Month in Ontario with a lecture by architectural historian Dr. Jennifer McKendry, a talk showcasing her latest book *Architects Working in the Kingston Region 1920-2000.* Books were available for purchase and a high tea will be served.

Wednesday, February 21st: The Annual General Meeting included the presentation of the Society's award to the Volunteers of the Great Lakes Museum through their Museum Manager and Curator, Doug Cowie. In turn, he was asked to speak briefly about their achievements over the years.

Wednesday, March 20th: Kingston railway historian Eric Gagnon discussed his extensive railway research: "**Two Miles, Two Tracks, Two Railways, To Obscurity.**" Eric's books – *Smoke on the Waterfront* and *Stories on the Waterfront* – have focused on the railway's impact on Kingston's economy.

Wednesday, April 17th: Queen's doctoral student Margaret Ross talked about the problem of "vice" in late nineteenth Kingston and the City's attempt to control its sex trade. "Your Town is Rotten': Prostitution, Profit and the Governing of Vice in Kingston, Ontario, 1860-1920s," recently published in the *Journal of the History of Sexuality.*

- **Wednesday, May 15th:** Military historian and first Deputy-Director of History and Heritage at the Department of National Defence Ian Macpherson McCulloch talked on his 2022 book *John Bradstreet's Raid 1758*. The raid, which saw French-held Fort Frontenac fall to Bradstreet's troops, proved a pivotal point in the so-called French and Indian War. **Thursday, June 6th:** The Society hosted the annual commemoration of Sir John A. Macdonald in Christ Church Cataraqui
- Wednesday, September 18th: Peter Gower talked on The ups and downs of the Kingston Historical Society's first 131 years ... and the future?

k) The Sir John A. Macdonald June 6 Graveside Ceremony Committee Report---2024

The forecast was for rain on 6 June and the service was moved indoors. We were very fortunate that Archdeacon Bill Clarke had offered us the historic, and recently de-sanctified, Christ Church Cataraqui on the southwest edge of the Cataraqui Cemetery as the inclement weather venue. As in the past several years, Don Richardson served as the MC.

The service began with the national anthem led for the first time by the KHS trio: Duncan McDowell, Paul Van Nest and Bill Clarke. A warm welcome was extended to the 50 attendees by Craig Boals, the manager of the Cataraqui Cemetery. Archdeacon Bill Clarke gave a religious reading and a prayer. Peter Gower, the KHS Vice-president, fittingly garbed in full Scottish highland outfit, welcomed everyone on behalf of the KHS and the Commemoration Service Committee. He then introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Stephen Smith, an historian with Parks Canada. Dr. Smith gave an engaging address titled "Macdonald's Four Lives at Bellevue House". Councillor and deputy mayor of Kingston, Gary Oosterhof, laid a commemorative wreath on behalf of the City of Kingston. (It is interesting to note that Sir John was an alderman for Kingston in 1843.) Anne Richardson then laid a wreath on behalf of the Kingston Historical Society. Both were escorted by Peter Gower.

This was followed by the playing of the Lament by piper Doug Green. Warren Everett then invited those assembled to join in a toast to Sir John. The service ended with closing remarks from MC Don Richardson. He expressed thanks to all those involved in making the commemorative service a wonderful testament to Canada's first Prime Minister and major mover in the creation of Canada. The service closed with the singing of 'God Save The King'.

The Society appreciates the photographic services of Eva Barnes. Many people participating voiced the sentiment that it was an excellent commemoration of our first prime minister, and a marvelous alternate historic location. We are indebted to Craig Pettis for producing the video. We hope to see you next year at the 2025 June 6 service commemorating the death of Sir John A. Macdonald, Canada's first prime minister, and hope that there will be no heavenly moisture.

8. The Treasurer's Report---2024

The generosity again this year of members and others through donations contributed significantly to the Society's 2024 solid financial year. Interest on investments also contributed to the Society's strong revenue in 2024. Expenditures were lower than budgeted for, so the Society ended the year with an operating surplus.


Under the leadership of our Murney Tower Museum Director a number of special events increased the Tower revenues. In addition, interest on investments meant the Tower finished the year with an operating surplus. The Tower Museum will celebrate its centennial in 2025. Special Events are planned and some began in 2024. Donations in support of these activities were sought in 2024 and nearly \$20,000 gathered to support the centennial celebrations.

Thanks to grants from the federal government, the City of Kingston's Heritage fund, the staff required to operate the Tower Museum and related activities were funded without dipping into reserves. Additional grants covered the costs of special initiatives. The Tower has ended the year with an operating surplus.

Overall, the Society is in a strong financial position. Details are set out in more detail in the Financial Statements prepared by the staff of Doane Grant Thornton.

Doug Petty was designated to review the 2024 financial records for the Society at year end. His report is attached.
